[Vegetables and Herbs as Ornamentals](#) — This site points out the aesthetic side of many edible plants and suggests roles they can play in ornamental plantings.

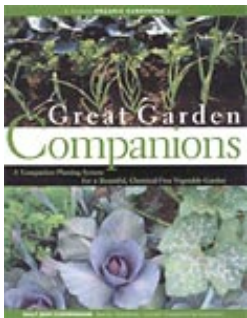

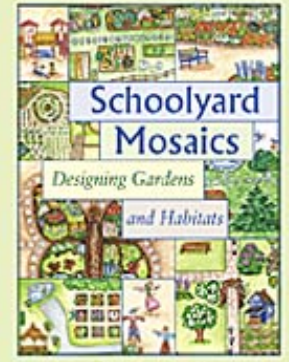
[In the Three Sisters Garden](#)
